Funding

Queen Mary Postgraduate Research Studentships

Open to suitably qualified candidates from the UK, EU, and Overseas. The Studentship comprises of the full cost of (home or overseas) fees and living expenses for 3 years.

AHRC London Arts and Humanities Partnership (LAHP)

Available to International and Home applicants.

There are also specific international scholarships schemes for China, Mexico, Colombia, Chile, USA and Commonwealth nations. These are cofunded and applicants should make an applications to the sponsor as well as to Queen Mary for the course.
