## Dear friend

I am glad to hear of M<sup>rs</sup> King's<sup>2</sup> release, as it will be a great relief to M<sup>rs</sup> Rayner<sup>3</sup> – I am reduced to my vegetables, but with a prospect of good success as <del>all</del> the symptoms of gall stones are now gone.

I shall be glad to see the new N° of your <u>Commentaries</u>. The last was particularly valuable. If you were to write ever so often in defence of unitarianism, you would always, I think, find something <u>new</u>; and it must be exhibited in every view, to counteract the attempts of the trinitarians, who leave no stone unturned to promote their cause.

I have long had it upon my mind to write an Address to the Jews,<sup>5</sup> and have now finished it, and when it is transcribed, I will send it to you. I think to print it first in English (it will only be a small pamphlet) and if it be likely to do good, shall get it -? translated into Hebrew by the learned Jew in this town who has promised to do it for me. They were never addressed by an Unitarian before; so that there is some little chance of being attended to, by some of them.

I have finished —? my Essay on the <u>perpetuity of Moses's law</u>, and shall put about two thirds of it into the next N° of the Repository, which will be published the first of next month. I do not expect to make many converts to my opinion.
