Dear friend

I have received the <u>Two Tracts</u> for Mr Russell, but not <u>Mr Wyche's piece</u> for myself. If you call again, I dare say you will still find it at Mr Johnson's. The <u>Great Doctor</u>, which at your recommendation, I sent for is a poor business indeed. Mr Madan's (which he sent me) is the //most// violent and menacing that I have yet seen.

The Bishop of our diocese⁶ was here last sunday confirming, and to each person confirmed he gave a small tract⁷ on confirmation, and another against socinianism, & myself (as I am told) in particular. I have not yet seen it.

I long much to see M.A,⁸ yet think I should not see it before it be printed. It I hope it will not be unnecessarily delayed. My own Reply to Mr Howes⁹ &c may rest till the winter. If he makes no reply to my Letter in the G. Magazine,¹⁰ I shall send him (open to you) a private letter, to inform him that there is such a letter &c and that it behoves him to take some notice of it. Such conduct as his, and D^r Horsley's,¹¹ must be exposed, as an example to others.

-?- Mr Christie's Letter¹² to you was given to Mr Tayleur. ¹³ I sent him last week a second from Mr Palmer, ¹⁴ with directions to send it to you.

I am glad of your opportunity of giving a living as it [[is]] another evident proof of your disinterestedness.

The two Mr Wilkinson's ¹⁷ are entirely separated, and my expectations //from them// are less than ever. My eldest son, who is now under the elder, has nothing but his board, no tea, or clothes; so that even he will be, for I know not how long, a considerable expence to me.

I hope to have made considerable progress in my <u>Ecclesiastical History</u>¹⁸ before I see you in the spring. We are waiting for paper to print the <u>Lectures on History</u>. They will employ us between three and four months. But I have little more to do to them.
