Dear friend

I have received the last parcel of MSS that I sent you, and am glad to find that they escaped censure better than the preceding. However, I do not despair of making the work, in all respects, what you wish it to be. ² But you expect <u>originality</u> where it is not to be had. In a general history, many things must be said which have often been said before, and cannot be said better. For example, a brief account of the principal <u>writers</u> is absolutely necessary in all the periods of the history, and as well as a particular account of <u>all</u> in the <u>earlier periods</u>; but those I shall profess to take, for the most³ [part, from Cave or Dupin.⁴

I now send the remainder of the work, and a few additions which I forsee will] increase as I read other histories, which I am doing, beginning with Nicephorus⁵ – I hope you will be able to get me Mosheim, tho I really expect little from him and therefore do not desire you to be in any hurry about it. I have already so far looked into Fleury or Sueur, as to see that I made no great omissions, and to be directed to authorities; and for some things I have at present quoted the former, till I can verify what he has given by some early writers, but some common place matters I shall probably leave as quoted from him. They [will not make many] pages in my work. [As to Lardner, I really think it better to leave what I have taken from him, on his authority, which no person will question.

I mean] to introduce more of the <u>history of the Jews</u> which I shall professedly take from Basnage[.]¹⁰ With all this there will be more that is truly originall in my history than in almost any other, especially in what is of the greatest importance, the natural <u>progress</u> of opinions, which has always been strongly¹¹ misconceived and misrepresented.

The work will be larger than I intended it to be and not much less than my <u>history</u> of early opinions. ¹² I [text missing] more respectable to pri[nt] [text missing] I wish you
