Dear friend

I have received the <u>Preface</u> &c, and shall some time hence return the <u>Dedication</u>¹ altered, I hope, to your mind, but there is no haste, as, in consequence of a cabal[?] among our Compositors, the work goes on but slowly at present.²

I have only <u>Rigaltius's edition of Tertullian</u>,³ which I believe is very common. If Mr Hamilton⁴ has it not, and wishes to see it, it is at his service.

My Letters to D^r Horsley⁵ are now transcribed, and I wish to get them into your hands as soon as possible. But as you —? will hardly to be in town till the latter end of the week, I will keep them till I can send those to Mr Barnard⁶ and D^r Knowles⁷ along with them. At the same time, I will send another copy of the first volume of my History⁸ for your use, and desire Mr Dodson⁹ to keep his. I shall complete it, as the sheets are printed, and desire his acceptance of it. ¹⁰

I know you will not like the Letters <u>in their present</u> state, but their asperities will be rubbed off, and many improvements may be introduced, before the time of publication. I could not well repress my indignation at the time of writing.

On tuesday next I have agreed to set out for Castle head, with my daughter¹¹ and Mr Finch,¹² an[d] may stay three weeks. I wish therefore you would write to me there, and let me know what you think of my letters <u>in general</u>. Particular remarks you may reserve till you return them <u>after my return</u>. You will observe that the <u>style of address</u> is not yet fetched upon. I have only written <u>My Lord</u> at the beginning of each letter. In this, as in every thing else, I shall be governed by you.¹³ You will note what I say of his <u>Newton</u>¹⁴ &c and, if you can, get me the necessary <u>authorities</u>. I really //think// so insolent a writer should be exposed.

You must not expect any thing materially <u>new</u> in these <u>Letters</u>, and I think that this will probably be my <u>last Defence of Unitarianism</u>. I have just begun my <u>Address to the Bishops</u>, which will be published the year following. ¹⁶

You must not despair of yourself, tho you perceive a failure in your memory. I do the same. However -?- //spare// yourself. You will last the longer. I am far from being a close student. I never fatigue myself in the least, and generally could do twice as much as I do. But I purposely relax a little, as I advise you to do.

I have the <u>translation</u> much at heart, and doubt not we shall have a very good one. I thank you for the <u>Letters</u>. They are in Mr Russells¹⁷ hands, and tomorrow I shall send them to Mr Tayleur. $\frac{18}{18}$
