Please to desire Mr Johnson to take care that the two <u>cancelled leaves</u> in the <u>Defences</u> be disposed of properly. There are also two cancelled leaves in the <u>History</u>,¹⁵ copies of which in sheets I hope he will receive in about two days.

The clergy here has appointed a meeting of all the clergy in the diocese, to oppose the Dissenters application. They will probably do something violent, and expose themselves, but they are very inveterate. When we see in how many cases <u>reason</u> has no effect at all, we cannot wonder at the slow progress of christianity.

All this week I have a bad cold, and most remarkable <u>hoarseness</u>. I shall hardly be able to preach on sunday but to day I feel myself rather better. I continue to have good accounts from Heath, and partly expect my wife and Harry¹⁶ to day, tho I write to desire them to stay longer. Sally¹⁷ is always in tears when her mother talks of leaving her. She recovers pretty well, but her spirits are low.
