## Dear friend

I have been in town every day since tuesday, expecting the parcell which you promised to send <u>on monday or tuesday</u>, and have not yet received it; but hope to find it today. I want it much for the sake of inserting various <u>additions</u>, and arranging the whole in the best manner, as I hope to begin to print it the next week. To prevent any more delay, I have got <u>the Preface</u> set, but not printed off, that you might make your remarks just as if it had been a MS, without any obligation to return it. I inclose it in this letter.<sup>1</sup>

I have heard from D<sup>r</sup> Price,<sup>2</sup> and have received from him the New Preface &c to his Sermon.<sup>3</sup> It is much to the purpose, and I think I may make some use of it in my Letters to Mr Burke.<sup>4</sup> D<sup>r</sup> Price readily concurs with me in procuring a degree for Mr Toulmin.<sup>5</sup> Suppose we, at the same time, recommend Mr Belsham.<sup>6</sup> I wish you would sound him about it, unless you think it would be better to do it without his knowledge. The objection to it is, that there are so many Doctors in London, that it is no honorary distinction there, tho it is in the country. On this account I really think that, were I in London, I should not chuse it.<sup>7</sup>

I shall be glad to see the <u>letter from Mr Kirwan</u>, 8 and shall hope to have it today, as I am going to put this into the Post, and look for -? //the// parcell from you.

Dr Price mentions his apprehension of the attempts of the Aristocrats to subvert the French governm<sup>t</sup>, but has no doubt of this being unsuccessful.

L<sup>d</sup> Stanhope<sup>9</sup> can hardly be serious in his design to impeach Mr Burke<sup>10</sup> of High Treason. However, it will make the subject talked of.

I am reading, and with great satisfaction, Ramsay's<sup>11</sup> History of the American Revolution, with a copy of which Mr B Vaughan<sup>12</sup> presented me, and I shall quote a passage or two from it in my Letters to Mr Burke.<sup>13</sup>
