Dear friend

Your letter, with the Bill inclosed, is come safe to hand.

You will find part of the <u>Conclusion</u> in p 60 &c of the 2^d edition. It was, in my opinion, and that of Mr Russell, the only part to which your former objection did not apply, tho now you recommend the latter part in preference of it. I really approve your former opinion, and therefore shall print the third edition in this respect like the second, tho with many such improvements. I hope it will be printed in tho'[[the?]] course of the week.

I am glad this business is over. For such is the state of my mind at present, that I could not do any thing of the kind. I own my weakness. I believe I am too much affected; but the disappointment is very great, and the difficulty of finding any suitable employment for Joseph² seems to increase continually. His consolation, however, and it is mu[ch][?] is that he has done nothing of which he has any reason to repent. I hope a good providence will appear for him in due time.

I have a letter from D^r Disney³ at Lincoln, which I shall inclose in my next, and another from Mr Thompson of Clapham, ⁴ //both// containing some things of which I avail myself in this third edition.

I am glad to hear that Mr Lee⁵ is again entering into public life. I hope he will [[be]] of some use to his country, tho my expectations from him are not what they formerly were. It will [[be]] a convenience to us occasionally to make use of his Covers.

- Young Mr Hawkes⁶ recommends Mr <u>Aubery⁷ of Stand</u> near Manchester to our congregation. I never heard of him before, but I think it probable we shall attend to the recommendation. We have sent some queries to Mr Hawkes about him.
