Dear friend

I inclose  $\underline{M^r}$  Toulmin's certificate, signed by  $D^r$  Price and myself, and I wish you would sign it too.

I thank you for mentioning my situation to the Duke of Grafton;<sup>3</sup> but till I hear from you again, I own I do not see the propriety of thanking him for his <u>intention</u>. It looks like catching at his favours, and binding him to the performance of what he may not have absolutely promised.

I have seen the <u>Vindication of Mr Burke</u>. For <u>sophistry</u>, and <u>impudence</u>, I never saw any thing equal to it. Part of it I think must have been written by himself. Such defences will do no service to any cause with men of sense; but it will please the many admirers of Mr Burke's own book.

Here I receive yours, and one from Mr Belsham.<sup>5</sup> My answer to <u>him</u>, on the subject of the <u>Sermon</u>,<sup>6</sup> I send open to you. It will give me a little time.

I have had a letter or two from Mr Small of Holywell<sup>7</sup> myself, and some lately, but not of consequence to send you.

I prefer the idea of a <u>slip of paper</u> pasted, or not pasted, on the inside of the cover, and would not, for the present at least, have the words you mention printed on the <u>title page</u> of the books. It may be done hereafter.

I have just made a experiment of great consequence, and shall soon send an account of it to the Royal Society. It proves that <u>water</u> and the <u>nitrous acid</u> consist of the same elements. I shall lay it before our lunar society on monday next.

Joseph<sup>8</sup> inclines much to settle in Manchester, on account of the liberal society he finds there, and he thinks he has already some prospect of an opening for him in a partnership there. I have many //many// friends very zealous to serve him there, and they are exerting themselves to the utmost for him.
